

# Australian Network for Plant Conservation presents a workshop on REHABILITATION AND MANAGEMENT OF DISTURBED NATIVE VEGETATION

Are you involved in the rehabilitation of native vegetation? Does your work-site include native vegetation that you need to manage or rehabilitate? Do you participate in local rehabilitation projects? Are you interested in reversing the decline of native plant communities in your area? Then this workshop is for you!

#### Workshop focus:

The knowledge and skills required to undertake ecological rehabilitation and management of disturbed native vegetation.

#### Themes include:

- NSW vegetation legislation essential for rehabilitation practitioners and projects.
- The ecological principles essential to planning a rehabilitation project.
- Applying the principles to actual rehabilitation projects (case studies, workshop activity, site visits, techniques).
- Understanding the task (the goal for the site, planning, consultation, issues such as conservation genetics, provenance, the role of soil-symbionts, monitoring and ongoing management).

The workshop will be a mix of presentations by experienced rehabilitation practitioners and visits to selected field sites. Participants will expand their skills and knowledge, challenge preconceptions, exchange ideas and expertise, work with experts and broaden networks.
